STROYAN NAMED ACADEMIC LIBRARIAN OF THE YEAR

Sandra R. Donahue, Illinois Mathematics and Science Academy

Dr. Susan E. Stroyan, Illinois Wesleyan University, Bloomington, has been selected as the 2000 Illinois Academic Librarian of the Year. This recognition has been given annually since 1986 to individuals making outstanding statewide contributions to academic or research librarianship and to library development.

Dr. Stroyan is the University Librarian at IWU where she is currently managing the design and construction of a new library facility. The structure is user focused, forward thinking, and built to be the absolute heart of the campus. In an age when new buildings are not deemed important because "all" information is available electronically, Dr. Stroyan has convinced administration and donors alike that Illinois Wesleyan does indeed need a modern facility to house its information resources. *(see Librarian of the Year, page 4)*

IACRL SPRING PROGRAM

A one-day workshop entitled *How Does the Library Matter? Defining and Assessing the Impact of Library Resources and Services* is in the planning stages for Spring 2001. Assessment is a complex and ongoing challenge. Traditional methods of assessment such as collection evaluations, statistical counts, and user satisfaction surveys provide useful data, However, better methods are required to demonstrate the ways that an academic library positively influences student learning, faculty research and development, and institutional achievements. PROPOSED IACRL BY-LAWS CHANGES

The IACRL Executive Committee has reviewed the by-laws of our organization and recommends several changes. Most of these changes are suggested in order to bring the by-laws into compliance with current practice. In the interest of saving room in the Newsletter, the by-laws with the imbedded corrections are available on the IACRL web site (<http://servercc.oakton.edu/~iacrl/>). Wording to be removed is noted by a strike-through, while wording to be added is in italics. Please refer to the web site to see the revisions in context. The organization will vote on these changes at our membership breakfast meeting on Tuesday, October 17, 2000, 7:00-8:30 a.m. during the annual ILA Conference in Peoria.

The rationale for the proposed changes follow:

Article VI, Section 2

The wording marked for deletion was added in 1997 to clarify the change in the beginning of our business year from the date of the ILA Conference to July 1 (to be consistent with the ILA business year). This additional wording is no longer necessary. *(see By-Laws , page 9)*

Dr. Stroyan's service to the profession is staggering, including ALA Counselor at Large, LAMA President, and ILA President. In addition, her research and publishing record is extensive. She has presented or published on copyright, medical literature, library advocacy, customer service, multitype issues, and more.

Colleagues describe Dr. Stroyan as friend, mentor, role model, scholar, evangelist, and all around good human being. She gives of herself on a very personal level. All of her efforts are clearly focused on improving her library, her home institution, and librarianship as a whole; she carries out her responsibilities with highest ethics, dignity, and respect.

The honor includes a certificate and a financial award from the sponsor, Ovid Technologies. In addition, the recipient's name is added to a plaque housed permanently at the Illinois State Library building. The award will be presented on Monday, October 16, during the Awards Presentation Ceremony at the ILA Annual Conference. The presentation ceremony will be preceded by a reception for the recipients, sponsors, and designated guests. Dr. Stroyan will also be recognized from the floor at the IACRL Business meeting on Tuesday morning.

The Awards Committee of the Illinois Association of College and Research Libraries, which is a Chapter of the Association of College and Research Libraries and a Forum of the Illinois Library Association, is charged with responsibility for soliciting nominations and choosing a recipient for the ILA Illinois Academic Librarian of the Year Award. Committee members included Sandra R. Donahue, (Illinois Mathematics and Science Academy), Chair; Pam Gaitskill, (Prairie State College); Allen Lanham (Eastern Illinois University); Carolyn Sheehy, (North Central College); and Edward P. (Ned) Wass, (University of Illinois at Springfield). ♦

COMMUNITY COLLEGE NEWS

The College of DuPage is partnering with the Donors Forum of Chicago to establish The Philanthropy Center, a philanthropic and fund raising resource center to meet the information needs of nonprofit organizations located in the western suburbs of Chicago. WATER LEAKAGE CONTINUES AT MILNER LIBRARY

Milner Library, Illinois State University, has suffered from leaks in the main roof and the plaza from the time the building opened in 1976. The university has tried a variety of corrective measures but none have effectively eliminated the leaks.

The most recent attempt to solve the problem involved building a \$1 million rain-catching canopy. The Teflon-coated fiberglass canopy is 156 feet long, 87 feet wide, and 15 feet tall from the floor of the plaza to the center of the canopy's underside. The fabric is shaped into 12 funnels that are designed to direct water into gutters and downspouts running through the center of 12 blue metal columns anchored in the plaza. The canopy design has drawn mixed reviews, with passers-by comparing it to everything from an upside down circus tent to a clipper ship in full sail. The long-term plans include adding planters and seating arrangements.

A severe thunderstorm on May 18th revealed the shortcomings of the structure. High winds blew rain under the canopy and hundreds of gallons of water leaked into the library. As a result, the university initiated a caulking project. Unfortunately, the caulking project was unfinished when another thunderstorm moved through the area on August 23rd, dumping from 1 to 1.6 inches of rain in a half-hour. By the next afternoon, 400 to 500 gallons of water had collected in buckets on the first floor. In addition to over a hundred buckets, the water also funneled through an elaborate makeshift system of plastic gutters, termed "diapers" by the staff, into large garbage pails. About 12,000 volumes had to be moved into study carrels or on to carts away from leaks. Many bookcases are draped in plastic. Beth Schobernd, Preservation Librarian, estimates that only about fifteen volumes were actually lost. However, 665 volumes were damaged and required special treatment.

The caulking project is now almost complete. The library staff remains optimistic that this latest project will result in substantial improvement to a longstanding problem. ♦

Heartland Heartland Community College has opened its new, permanent campus in Normal. Construction began two years ago on the 160-acre site. About 4,000 students are enrolled for the fall semester. Julie Wolf, Director of Library and Information Services, noted that the 3,700-square-foot library stacks area is 3,000-square-feet more than before. The Library is located in the Academic Support Center (ASC) with a computer lab, tutoring, testing, and open learning. Many have commented that the ASC is the architectural jewel of the new campus. All the classrooms at the new campus have instruction stations, which feature a ceiling-mounted projector linked with a videocassette recorder, a document camera, and computer with DVD capabilities. Many classrooms, including the library instruction room, are computerized classrooms. The new campus is located at 1500 W. Raab Road in Normal. ♦

Article VI, Section 8

Upon the resignation of our Past-President, the Executive Committee realized that no mechanism existed for filling that vacancy. The proposed addition will enable the President to appoint someone to fulfill the duties of Past-President. It conforms with the mechanism for replacement of the Secretary/Treasurer.

Article VII, Section 1

The ACRL College Section's National Advisory Council no longer exists.

Article IX, Section 9

The Publications Committee is no longer responsible for publishing a directory and has added maintenance of the web site to its duties.

Article X

No mechanism for establishing Ad Hoc committees previously existed. The Executive Committee felt it was important to be able to make such appointments.

Article XI and following

Article numbers are changed to reflect the addition of the article on Ad Hoc committees.

Article XI, Section 1

Distance learning has been added as a discussion group topic to reflect current practice.

Article XIII

The number of public university representatives to the IACRL/IBHE Liaison Committee has been changed from 2 to 4 to reflect current practice.

Article XIV, Section 3

The Chapter/Government Relations Representative no longer serves as a liaison to the Illinois Board of Higher Education. ♦

Early this spring, the Illinois State Library brought together representatives of all the library consortia in the state for the first meeting of E-Partners of Illinois, a group created to address issues related to electronic resources. Invited guests included directors, chairs, or presidents of 28 consortia and/or regional library systems in the state involved in or interested in electronic resources, along with members of the ILLINET Network Advisory Council (INAC). More than 50 individuals are involved in E-Partners numbers at this time.

Illinois academic libraries participated in this spring’s Electronic Resource Opportunity offered through the Alliance of Library Service Networks, OCLC regional offices. The numbers are as follows: Oxford English Dictionary, 180 libraries thanks to the Illinois Digital Academic Library (IDAL); American National Biography, 7; Grove’s Dictionary of Art, 22; New Grove Dictionary of Opera Online, 15; McGraw-Hill’s AccessScience, 5. The national success of these offerings has already led to discussion of additional opportunities in the future.
